Introduction

The 2014 Colorado County Comparison Report has been produced as a reference tool with particular consideration to be used to assist small and medium sized counties around the State in the development of their annual budgets. This report provides a variety of comparative data that counties may find useful and valuable for evaluating their budget plans. It is important to note the omission (unless otherwise designated) of the 10 most populous counties as that group annually takes efforts to prepare their own comparison report. In addition, the two City and County governments in Colorado (Broomfield and Denver) are excluded from this report in all instances when comparing counties “statewide”.

Due care and caution have been utilized in the preparation of this report; the information has been gathered from a number of sources which are generally considered accurate and reliable. However both human and computational errors are in many cases inherent in such types of reports and in some cases full information and data may not have been available.

This collection of data provides some referential points of interest; in addition comparison of budget information may provide further insight into comparable county operations. County budget information is not uniform, and line item detail, full time equivalent (FTE) employee information, and other budget aspects may or may not be included on a case by case basis, however all county budgets are available on the Divisions website at www.dola.colorado.gov/lgis and may be reviewed for comparative purposes. It is probable that similarly named funds may include groups of expenditure items which are not identical; **When comparing any budgetary figures, keep in mind such values may not provide an “apples to apples” comparison.**


Data tables and summary information are available using [Google Fusion Tables](http://www.google.com/fusiontables/) at <http://goo.gl/o2GEWF>. Using fusion tables, individual columns can be selected to view particular information in the data table (* click – tools > select columns), columns can be sorted (alpha, numeric, or other), and additionally the “Filter” function allows for comparisons of any column of information by range or type of information. This allows for comparison of counties to one another by region, classification or other ranges of values.

Population Projections




Population

Colorado’s 52 small and medium sized counties are diverse. When we look at the most recent population estimates of these counties, we can see they range from a low of 687 (San Juan County) to as high as 57,298 (Garfield County). The median population value (where half of the sampled counties’ populations are higher and the other half are lower) for this group of counties is 9,572; but looking at the distribution we find that seventy-five percent of those counties populations are below 20,000 and a quarter of the counties’ populations are below 5,000.

Looking at where the population resides in these counties, we can confirm some assumptions that many have of our smaller and more rural counties across

the state. If all counties are taken into consideration, we find that 70% of the population lives within municipal boundaries. However when we look specifically at the residence in the 52 small and medium sized counties, we find a significant change in municipal residence with only 51% of the population within municipal boundaries and the other 49% living in unincorporated areas.


Incorporated vs. Unincorporated Population Distribution



County Revenue

The picture of county revenue, though a bit dated looking at 2010 data from DOLA’s County Financial Compendium, shows the importance of various revenue portions for counties across Colorado. In particular, we see the importance of General Property Taxes at 40% of all county revenues, followed by Intergovernmental revenue (revenue from State, Federal and other local government sources) at 31% and rounding out the top three with Sales and Use Tax at 13%.

Mill Levies


Property tax revenue is generated by each county certifying its mill levy against the assessed value (AV) of property within that county’s jurisdiction. In the 2014 budget year, the statewide total AV of property across all counties (Denver and Broomfield excluded) totaled \$76,155,004,071. While comparison of median or average mill levies and AVs can provide valuable points of reference, each county has a different makeup of valuation which can be very distinct from another. When comparing levies, it is necessary to compare each county’s valuation to understand the differences in the ultimate levy value each county has certified.



While the total aggregate value provides us the magnitude of value statewide as one metric, the range of value tells a different story; the range shows a handful of counties with a significantly higher assessed value than most others (high of \$7.6 Billion to a low of \$39 Million).


The average county AV for 2014 was \$1.228 Billion dollars; this again provides a point of reference, but most of the counties in the state may be misled if they compare their own AV numbers to that value. As the plot to the right illustrates, only one quarter (16) of the 62 counties have AVs of higher than the average, with the remaining 46 counties (74%) having assessed values “below average”. This demonstrates why it may be more valuable to compare with the median value (where half of the counties are above and half are below this level) of \$321.2 Million to provide a better relative comparison. Even further it may be beneficial to look at groups of peer counties within a relative range each county’s particular AV or other variables to make comparisons.

Assessed Value Range (000)




Assessed value is an indicator of the level of service demand within a county, while also being the source of the primary method of revenue generation. Each county carefully considers their AV to determine service need and the associated rate of tax levy to generate revenue for those services. The “total levy” value (below) is made up of all certified levies for all purposes. Levy types include general levy, road and bridge, public welfare (social services), and any other kind of levy which range from capital, retirement, open space, libraries, public safety (police-fire-EMS), airports, self-insurance and a few other levy types.


The graphs above provide the range of mill levies certified for all of the 52 small and medium sized counties in budget year 2014. Broken down by quartile, the first and fourth quartile (bottom and top 25% of counties) are whiskers, the second and third quartile are the boxes and the median is explicitly numbered.

In 2014 the median “total levy” across the sample in the evaluation was 20.021 mills, but ranged from a low of 7.500 to a high of 46.553 mills. The “general levy” which is certified to provide for a county’s general purposes, had a median of 16.650 mills and a range from 3.097 to 30.581 mills. We find similar ranges for other levy types which vary greatly, but the median values come in at 1.444 mills for road and bridge, 1.400 mills for public welfare (social services) and a median of 1 mill sum for all other purposes.



It may be asked – What is an appropriate levy? One thought may be that each county should strive to be at the median, however as previously mentioned, each county has a different make-up of valuation and different levels of service that are provided. Accordingly, each county must evaluate what is appropriate for their jurisdiction, and the range distributions of levies may assist in evaluating the other counties values and determinations of levies for the year.

Sales and Use Taxes

Sales taxes are levied against sales of goods within the State, county and/or other overlapping local government jurisdiction; use taxes are collected on items which are used within a jurisdiction which were not subject to the local sales tax rate at time of purchase but are used within a county jurisdiction where use tax applies.

Collections of sales tax for counties are administered by the Colorado Department of Revenue and are remitted to each county on a monthly basis. Use taxes are collected individually by each county where they apply and other local governments individually (though State, Regional Transportation District, and Scientific and Cultural Facilities District use taxes are required to be submitted to the CO Dept. of Revenue where applicable). An important note on use taxes is that counties and statutory municipalities may only collect use taxes on vehicles and building

materials which are purchased outside of their jurisdictions and subsequently reside or are used within those jurisdictions (home rule municipalities may have further applications of use taxes).

Counties have the option of establishing a sales tax, and additionally allowing for certain exemptions of goods in certain categories from the applicable county tax percentage (all optional goods which may be exempted by a county are exempt from the State sales tax rates – see [CO Dept. of Revenue Report DR 1002](#) for additional information on rates and exemptions).

The State sales and use tax rates equal 2.9%, the county sales tax is then applied and finally any municipal and/or special district sales tax may apply where applicable overlapping jurisdictions exist. The distribution of sales and use tax rates is presented above left. The median sales tax rate statewide (again excluding the two City and County governments) is 1% with the full range from 0.00% to a high of 5%. There is grouping as the distribution shows, of the sampled 52 counties twelve (19%) counties had no sales tax, nineteen counties (30%) assess a flat 1% sales tax, and twelve (19%) assess a 2% sales tax.

Use tax rates tell a similar story, as the median use tax rate is 0.00%; in other words over half (35 counties) of the statewide counties sampled do not have a use tax rate. Twelve of those remaining counties have use rates of 1%, six of 2%, and the remaining nine counties rates range between 0 to 4%.

County Categories

There are a number of different categorizations of county governments. For this report we have removed the 10 “big”, or most populous counties (CCI Front Range Region in addition to Mesa County – City and Counties are also excluded) from all group calculations and listings. The data tables in the report have been sorted first by CCI Region and second by Transportation and Planning Region to provide ease in regional comparisons. The [data tables available online](#) include all counties with the exception of City and County governments, and can be filtered by any of the category types desired.



Eastern Region



The Eastern Region located in the northeast corner of the State, bordering Nebraska and Kansas to the North and East and the “front range” counties to the West. This region is on average the lowest population density in the state with approximately 7 people per square mile. The region’s primary economic driver has traditionally been and continues to be Agriculture. Agricultural valuation makes up approximately 7% of the lowest county proportion and more than 42% of the AV in the highest in the counties within the region.



A newer economic driver of late has been the development of oil and gas resources within the region, though the industry activity has not been evenly distributed. Valuations within the region range from a low of approximately


0.5% to a high of nearly 64%, which illustrates the vast differences from county to county within the region.

Assessed Value Range (000)




When evaluating the region relative to others, Eastern Region mill levies are the highest average rates (29.403 mills) in the State. This is in part due to the low relative AV, with the 2014 median AV of \$149 million compared to the statewide median of over \$321 million. One of the reasons for the low value in this region is the amount and method of assessment of agricultural land.

Total and General Levy






Evaluating 2014 sales and use taxes

within the region we find 4 of the 10 counties in the region have sales and use taxes of 0%. The remaining six counties rates are 1% or higher (up to 2%). One distinct difference between counties in the Eastern Region and all others is the parity between sales tax rates and use tax rates; each of the Eastern Region counties use tax is equal to their sales tax rate. This is different than the observed practice statewide as over half of the 62 counties in Colorado do not assess use tax as a companion to county sales tax.

Mountain Region



The Mountain Region consists of thirteen counties geographically located in the central portion of the state ranging from Custer County at the south end of the region, to Jackson County along the Wyoming Border in the north. The counties in this region straddle the continental divide and make up the headwaters of the Arkansas, Colorado, North Platte, and South Platte rivers.

The region's economy has historically been driven by mining activities, but much of the region has benefitted more recently from tourism and outdoor recreation activities. Some mining activities still exist within some counties including significant producing mines in Clear Creek, Lake and Teller Counties.




The mining trend has however taken the back seat to residential property valuation making up the most significant portion of valuation across the region.

In 2014 the Mountain region had the widest range of AV with the median value of \$433 million. The range of valuation in the region is significant as the top 3 highest AVs in this group (Eagle, Pitkin and


Assessed Value Range (000)



Total and General Levy







Summit) are more than double the fourth highest AV of the group. In part the relatively high assessed values in the region have allowed these counties to certify lower average mill levies when compared to other regions.

The median sales tax rates within the region reflect the opposite of the levy trend, as this region has a higher median rate than the other 3 regions in this survey at 2%. Over half of the counties however do not have a use tax which could generate significant value as construction has been significant in most of the Mountain counties.


Sales and Use Tax Rates



Southern Region




The Southern Region consists of fourteen counties stretching from the State’s eastern boundary with Kansas to the headwaters of the Rio Grande River in the San Luis Valley. The region is split between the east and west by the Sangre de Cristo Mountains and

Pueblo County exists as a centrally located regional hub. The region is primarily rural with the second lowest population density in the state at an average of approximately 10 people per square mile.

Assessed Value Range (000)




The economy in the region has a history in steel, coal mining, and some natural gas production, but the primary driver even now, continues to be agricultural activities. Segments of energy production continue, a significant number of institutions are located within the region (prisons, state health care facilities, CSU Pueblo, Adams State), as well as retirees and tourism providing to be significant


economic drivers. This economic diversity, however, is segmented widely across the region.

Mill levies in the Southern region cross a wide range, with total levies from the low of 9.525 to high at 46.553, which is the highest levy of any county statewide. The Southern Region has the lowest median assessed value statewide at just above \$100 million. This low value, similar to the Eastern region, is a driver of higher certified mill levies in order to generate revenue in sufficient amounts to provide county services.

Total and General Levy




The county median sales tax rate within the Southern region is 1.00%, but ranges from 0% to 2.6% with 4 of the 14 having a zero sales tax levy. Similar to the Mountain region, 9 of the 14 counties in the Southern region have no use tax as a companion tax.

Western Region



The Western Region is the largest of the regions in regard to land area, making up of nearly one third of the area of the State of Colorado. The region touches three of Colorado’s borders, Wyoming in the North, New Mexico in the South and Utah to the West. This region can be categorized as rural with an average of 12 persons per square mile but also has three regional population centers in Durango, Montrose, and the largest Grand Junction.


The economy in this region is diverse and depends particularly on location to amenities and to natural resources. Important economic drivers include mining, oil and natural gas production,


agriculture, tourism, energy production and retiree transfers.

Assessed Value Range (000)




The assessed value of the region varies widely, similar to that when we look at Colorado statewide. The median AV in the region is just under \$500 Million, with a range of \$44.3 Million to the high of \$2.896 Billion. The high assessed values generally include a substantial amount of oil and gas valuation.





The mill levies in the region are

lower than the statewide values, but reflect similar trends. The median total levy is 15.970 mills, with general levies making up the majority of the levy value as opposed to other levy types which tended to make up a higher proportion in other regions.

The regional median rate of 2% sales tax is higher than the state median, and 2 of the counties levy no sales tax. This region includes the county with the highest statewide sales tax rate of 5.0% (Hinsdale) which is heavily reliant on tourism revenue. Use tax reflects similar trends to statewide, with no such tax in half of the counties
